## So, what are we doing now?

**Our calling remains the same.** We want to see Christ known among the nations, to see local churches throughout the world grow deep roots in the Biblical worldview, and, as a result, reach out to the least, last, and lost within their communities and beyond. And so, our calling continues to be: to encourage, equip, and engage people in disciple-making movements around the world.



With this passion for missions, we are continuing to serve as missionaries with <u>Global Outreach International</u>, now on their Mobilization Team – to recruit, mentor, train, and prepare people to serve in cross-cultural missions. As Global has a new vision to pro-actively recruit 100 well-prepared and well-cared-for missionaries a year, we have been developing processes and procedures of multiple pathways for people interested in cross-cultural missions, from those who just sense a call to explore the possibility of missions to those who are certain of their call in long-term missions:

- Discernment Trip (1 to 2 weeks)
- Short-Term (2 weeks to 2 months)
- Internship (2 months to 1 year)
- Mid-Term (9 months to 2 years)
- Long-Term (2 years or more)

In addition to working with Global Outreach International, we have been serving with three other

The Freedom Boys Ministry seeks to rescue, rehabilitate, and resettle boys living on the streets of Soroti, Uganda, in the love of Christ. We've had the privilege to walk alongside this ministry since its humble beginnings under a mango tree in 2009, and we continue to do so stateside as advisors and fundraisers. We are thankful for the time we had to spend with Denis Okwera, the director of the Freedom Boys Ministry, this past summer to help

establish new systems of governance with a board of directors, and of accountability with Josh Shaarda (our brother-in-law serving in Soroti) providing on-the-ground oversight.



Freedom In Christ Ministries exists in over 35 countries to equip the Church to bring transformation to every nation and generation with a highly effective discipleship approach and resources to making fruitful disciples who make a real difference. For the past 2 years, I have been serving as a Hub Leader in Transform, their 8-

month program for leaders to journey into greater freedom, fruitfulness, and disciple-making. I have also had the privilege of being on a team with some of their leadership from UK, France, Jamaica, USA, and Canada to develop a new course "Becoming the Church God Imagines." I am also seeking to integrate the Freedom in Christ discipleship courses and resources in the training of missionaries at Global Outreach International, the rehabilitation of the Freedom Boys, and the mentoring of youth at MentorMe.



MentorMe of West Michigan hires, trains, guides, and supports Christian men and women between the ages of 20 and 70 or older to walk alongside, mentor and disciple "at-risk" youth ages 10 to 18, 2-4 hours per week each. Studies have shown that quality Christian mentorship significantly improves the emotional, behavioral, social, mental/academic, and spiritual development of youth who are at risk for falling behind and off track – for anxiety, depression, suicide, dropping out of high-school, teen pregnancies, substance abuse, and criminal activity. Our desire is to see "at-risk" youth become "at-promise" youth who love and live for Jesus. I serve on MentorMe's leadership team and as a Guide to three mentors.
